BP 4232 Pass/No Pass	Reference:
REPLACES CREDIT/NO CREDIT (FORMER BP 5158)	

Reference: Title 5, Section 55022 (formerly: 51302)

Courses may be offered in either or both of the following categories:

- Courses in which all students are evaluated on a "pass/no pass" basis.
- Courses in which each student may elect during registration, or within 30 percent of the term, whether the basis of evaluation is to be "pass-no pass" or a letter grade.

Effective fall 2008 the "credit/no credit" grade is replaced by the "pass/no pass" grade. Prior to Fall 2008 "credit/no credit" grades remain in effect.

Courses designated in the above categories shall be identified in the class schedule as well as in the course outlines

The student is held responsible for all assignments and examinations required in the course. The standards of evaluation are identical for all students in the course.

A student electing to be evaluated on the "pass/no pass" basis will receive both course credit and unit credit upon satisfactory completion of the course.

In computing a student's grade-point average, grades of "pass/no pass" are omitted. However, units attempted for which the symbol "NP", or "NC" (as defined in Section 55023) is recorded shall be considered in probation and dismissal procedures.

A pass grade is granted for performance that is equivalent to the letter grade of "C" (2.0) or better. A student, who fails to perform satisfactorily, less than "C" (2.0), will be assigned a "no pass" grade.

Students may enroll in only one course per semester on a pass-no pass option.

No more than 12 units of pass-no pass may be applied to the Associate in Arts or Associate in Science degree.

Courses listed in the schedule as pass-no pass grading option may be taken only once for pass-no pass. The student may, however, repeat the course for a letter grade.

Students, who have selected the pass-no pass grading option, may change back to a letter grade prior to the fourth week or 20% deadline. After the fourth week or 20% deadline, students may **not** reverse their pass-no pass grading decision.
